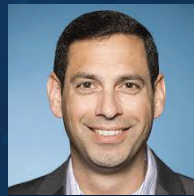

Letter to Our Community

A billion of anything is a lot, but when you're talking dollars granted to important not-for-profits, the impact that sum can have on local and national nonprofits, our region and the philanthropic community is immeasurable.

Last year, FFTC fundholders hit that mark for the first time in our history, **granting more than \$1 billion to nonprofits in our region and beyond**. Our fundholders also contributed \$656 million direct to FFTC funds, opened 140 new FFTC funds and pushed our planned-giving pipeline — commitments made to give in the future as part of an estate gift — to more than \$1 billion.

When we launched our Strategic Framework in late 2024, we identified five pillars needed as an organization to fulfill our mission of remarkable impact: **grow philanthropy; make unique civic and social impact; do it all sustainably; be a beloved community partner; and lead our sector locally and nationally**.

The generosity our fundholders showed in 2025 is a strong step forward in growing philanthropy. Other examples of remarkable impact in 2025 aligned with our strategic framework include:

- To support sustainability, last year we introduced the **FFTC Legacy Society** to engage and steward planned giving donors and Collective Giving Funds to create accessible, collaborative pathways for donors to give together.
- Last March, we opened the **Carolina Theatre at Belk Place**, welcoming capacity audiences, launching film series and hosting high-profile events including a sold-out evening with Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson. The restoration of the Carolina Theatre and its launch as a civic venue is part of our focus on being a beloved community partner.
- To make a unique civic and social impact, we are reimagining the **Robinson Center for Civic Leadership** (our flagship program centered on civic impact), focusing on the sustainability of nonprofits and supporting them through volunteer engagement, digital resources and more. To that end, last year we helped launch the **Agility Together initiative** — monthly workshops designed to help nonprofits respond to today's challenges.
- To advance our goal of leading our sector locally and nationally, we launched monthly **Nonprofit Office Hours**, increasing accessibility to FFTC staff and resources for nonprofits across the region, with nearly 100 nonprofits participating. We also hosted four **FFTC Connects** events, which spotlight local nonprofits working on issues affecting our community and "connects" them to fundholders who are interested in the issues they are addressing.

There are countless other examples: The Foundation created a \$4 million endowed Field of Interest Fund to address homelessness locally; our fundholders awarded \$4 million in scholarships to 1,000+ students; and our 13 regional affiliates granted more than \$1.2 million through 123 grants across North and South Carolina. In short, it was a tremendous year for our fundholders, the Foundation and the concept of generosity.

And, coming soon, we will launch a number of tools and enhancements designed to elevate the experience and impact of our fundholders and partners — **including an enhanced fundholder portal and website** — and will introduce meaningful new engagement opportunities throughout the year. These changes have one thing in common — they build on the work that was done before and better position the Foundation for future success.

As a community foundation, our focus remains our fundholders and the region we serve, and our work starts with your commitment to the Foundation and your community. Thank you for an amazing year!

The Robinson Center for Civic Leadership Looks Ahead in Support of Nonprofits

The Robinson Center for Civic Leadership, our flagship program, plays a central role in advancing FFTC's mission by turning philanthropy into coordinated civic action. That role became especially important as nonprofits across our region entered one of the most challenging periods in recent history.

Rising demand for services, reductions in public funding and declines in private support are placing extraordinary pressure on nonprofit organizations, threatening the stability of services that families and communities depend on. In response, the Robinson Center committed to acting deliberately and staying informed, ensuring that efforts to support the sector were grounded in real-time data and aligned strategy.

In March 2026, Foundation for the Carolinas and United Way of Greater Charlotte, with support from SHARE Charlotte, released findings from a late-2025 study conducted with UNC Charlotte's Urban Institute. The study, which surveyed 203 nonprofit leaders across Mecklenburg County, revealed significant strain:

- Nearly one-third of respondents reported losing public funding in 2025.
- 86% experienced negative impacts to their financial health.
- Demand for services continued to rise, forcing leaders to make difficult decisions about staffing, operations and reach.

These local findings reflect broader statewide and national trends. Across our region and beyond, nonprofits are experiencing funding disruptions that threaten long-term sustainability, underscoring the need for coordinated, proactive support. In response, the center activated **Agility Together**, a core expression of its commitment to strengthening the nonprofit sector:

- Developed in partnership with Share Charlotte, United Way of Greater Charlotte and The Lee Institute, Agility Together focuses on building nonprofit capacity through practical tools, learning opportunities and expert support
- Since its launch in April 2025, more than 1,000 nonprofit leaders have participated in 11 **Agility Together Workshops**, offered both in person and virtually, with recordings available on demand.
- The initiative also includes a **Resource Hub** for ongoing access to guidance and a **Civic Impact Corps pilot**, connecting nonprofit leaders with private-sector experts for targeted coaching.

As Agility Together marks one year and prepares to expand across FFTC's 13-county region, the Robinson Center for Civic Leadership remains focused on strengthening the organizations that power our community — today and for the future.

Through the **Robinson Center for Civic Leadership**, we bring together generous donors, engaged community members and dedicated partners to take on the region's most pressing challenges. When collaboration and innovation meet shared purpose, progress follows. Here's a snapshot of what we accomplished together in 2025.

Recent Impact Highlights

- **1,000+** nonprofit leaders engaged in **11 Agility Workshops** — monthly sessions on strategy, communications and fiscal leadership.
- **50 grants totaling more than \$160,000** were deployed by fundholders in response to SNAP funding delays, supporting Nourish Up and Second Harvest Food Bank as food insecurity surged across the region.
- **100+** nonprofit leaders connected through Nonprofit Office Hours, offering direct access to FFTC leaders and peer learning opportunities.



During Agility Together: Mergers & Strategic Partnerships Framework, community leaders explored how organizations can collaborate while staying grounded in their mission and community impact. In 2025, the Agility series engaged more than 650 nonprofit leaders.



Launched in 2025, hundreds of nonprofit leaders have connected with FFTC staff and other nonprofit leaders through our Nonprofit Office Hours, sharing strategy and peer-learning opportunities.



A collaboration between FFTC, United Way of Greater Charlotte, the Lee Institute and SHARE Charlotte, the Agility Workshops provide monthly strategy and information sessions to nonprofit leaders.



The Academic Learning Center serves students in academic and financial need in Cabarrus County, N.C. They were recently awarded \$6,000 for after-school tutoring to students in Kannapolis.



Grant recipient Carolina Quintana Ocampo brings her illustrated story, *Mi Modo*, to life with support from the Artist Support Grant and Emerging Creator Fellowship from the Arts & Science Council.

2025 Grants to Nonprofits

Foundation for the Carolinas awards grants to public charities within our 13-county region and throughout the United States.

The vast majority of grants (98%) are recommended by fundholders from their FFTC-held funds to benefit the nonprofits and causes of their choosing. Conversely, discretionary grants are recommended by FFTC's local volunteer boards and committees and represent 2% of total grantmaking.

The following charts represent total grantmaking from all FFTC funds, as well as the portion that is discretionary for the benefit of local needs:

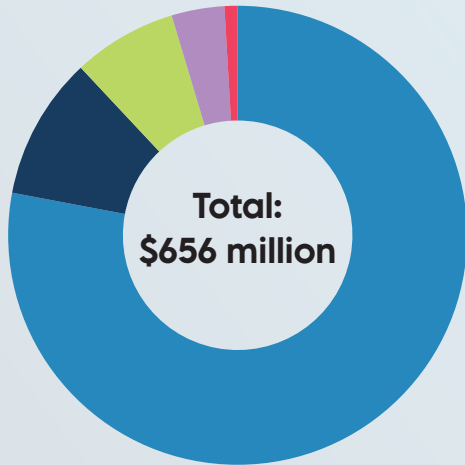

FFTC manages a variety of charitable fund types with different purposes and restrictions.

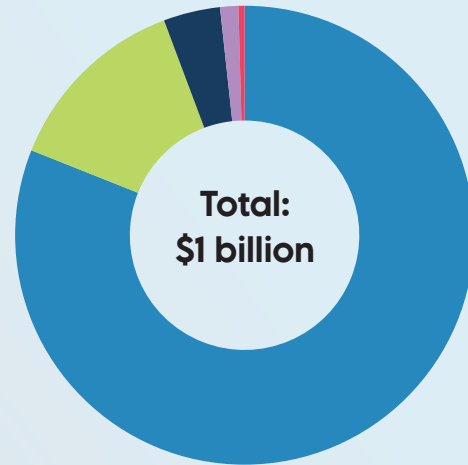
- **Donor-Directed:** Funds from which donors recommend grants to nonprofits most meaningful to them.
- **Nonprofit/Agency Funds:** Established by nonprofits for the long-term sustainability of their work.
- **Employee Disaster and Hardship Funds:** Managed by FFTC's subsidiary, E4E Relief.
- **Discretionary Funds:** Allow FFTC's volunteer grantmaking boards to address critical community needs.
- **Scholarship Funds:** Established by fundholders to help students achieve educational dreams.

2025 Contributions to FFTC Funds by Type



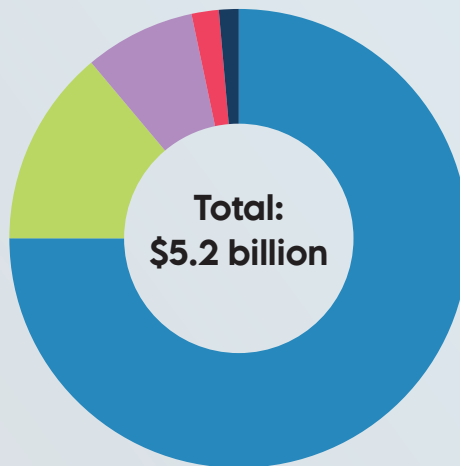

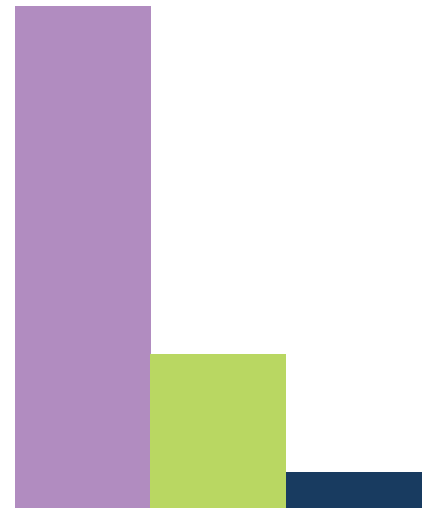

By transforming a simple meal into a moment of belonging, the Family Meal strengthens Charlotte's social fabric and honors the organization's long legacy of compassion and community.

Leading on Opportunity: A Lasting Framework

Since 2017, Leading on Opportunity has helped direct more than \$1 billion in public and philanthropic investment toward affordable housing, early education, workforce development and racial equity—while embedding economic mobility into the strategies and budgets of our region's civic ecosystem. Its work enabled more than 5,000 affordable housing units, expanded Universal Pre-K, advanced transformative transit and housing investments, and aligned leaders through a shared language and approach to large-scale challenges.

Leading on Opportunity will sunset in summer 2026, marking the close of a nearly decade-long chapter of systems-change leadership housed at Foundation for the Carolinas. While the initiative is ending, its impact on economic mobility in Charlotte-Mecklenburg is enduring.

As Leading on Opportunity sunsets, its work lives on in stronger systems, measurable progress and a community better equipped to ensure opportunity for all.

Big stage, big memories! See what's playing at the Carolina Theatre

In March 2026, the newly restored Carolina Theatre at Belk Place celebrated the one-year anniversary of the return of the 1920s-era theatre. For nearly 50 years, The Carolina remained vacant.

But with a diverse lineup of acts and community-based programming — including sold-out performances of the beloved *The Sound of Music*, discussions with both best-selling author Brené Brown and Supreme Court Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson, even a concert from original “Supreme” Diana Ross — audiences rediscovered their love of the theatre during its first year being fully restored. Consider these numbers:

- 180 events hosted with 40% being community-based.
- More than 5,000 K-12 students attended performances.
- 800+ free tickets to veterans through the Vet Tix program.
- More than 12,000 tickets donated, overall.
